They also have more cars here than we do in Denmark, and the car is important. They rarely walk, and the roads are not built for pedestrians. Some places the sidewalk is only on one side of the road; other places there are no sidewalks at all.

However, I like the weather here which is more or less like home. When the sun is shining, it is warmer, though, and the summer is longer, too. I like that! I like being here, but I also look forward to going home again. Denmark is still where I belong.
